It was such a happy, joyous, wonderful and honoured moment to unveil the UNESCO Asia-Pacific Awards for Cultural Heritage Conservation with Mr Eric Falt, Director, UNESCO New Delhi Cluster office, along with Dr Angchok Munshi (owner of Munshi house), Mr Stanzin Gyaltson (owner of Gyaoo house), Dr Monisha Ahmed (Co-Founder and Executive Director, LAMO) and Tashi Morup (Projects Director, LAMO). Former Ambassador, Mr Phunchok Stobdan, gave the keynote address.

LAMO received the 'Award of Distinction' from UNESCO Asia-Pacific, in November 2018, for its systematic restoration project that used salvaged and local building materials, and indigenous construction techniques while adroitly introducing modern amenities to assure its ongoing use as a dynamic arts space for local residents and visitors.

Ladakh Literature Festival



The first ever Literature Festival of Ladakh began with an inauguration ceremony at the, towering Leh Palace. The 17th century historic building, its renowned inhabitants and the Old Town of Leh have inspired several stories in Ladakh. LAMO, alongside Tourism Department Leh and All Ladakh Tours Operators (ALTOA) were main organizers of the Literature Festival, 2019.

The Festival was the brainchild of Shri Rigzin Samphel (IAS), when he was Tourism Secretary to the Government of Jammu and Kashmir. He imagined this festival and provided us the much-needed support to hold it. LAMO played the key role in designing the program which was reworked thoroughly under the supervision and guidance of Divisional Commissioner Leh, Shri Saugat Biswas (IAS).

The first edition of Ladakh Literature Festival was conceived with the vision to bring together writers from Ladakh as well as other parts of the country. The focus of the festival was on the region's history, philosophy, art and architecture, culinary traditions, travel, wildlife and the environment and mountaineering. One of the ideas behind the festival was to reach out to people across the Himalayas, so that dialogue and exchange of ideas can take place in this region stretching from Bhutan in the east to Ladakh in the west.

It brought together writers, artists, filmmakers, musicians, journalists, storytellers, historians, environmentalists, mountaineers, culinary experts, and many more from different fields – with the aim of broadening channels of dialogue between creative practitioners from diverse fields. Performances too were held looking at traditional and contemporary forms of music and dance in Ladakh. Various workshops were organised looking at art, woodblock printing, graphic designs, music for differently abled kids and many more.

The festival was attended by people from all walks. It was exuberant affair of sharing and exchanging ideas. The festival encouraged the traditions of writing and storytelling in Ladakh. In the coming years it is hoped to reach out to more people, across the Himalayas, and also from other parts of the world who have an interest in this region.

Exhibition

The myriad shades of a sunset, the endless stretches of land, a purple sky, the reflection of clouds in a placid lake, a solitary building, these are some of the images reglected in Jigmet Angmo's works as she explores the land and its built heritage. Jigmet works in watercolour, intrigued by the medium's delicacy, transparency, suppleness and unpredictability. But also appreciates the medium for its unforgiving nature, how sometimes one has to be willing to go with the flow and let your brush (and the paint) follow its own course. She prefers to work in small format, perhaps restricting the side of her work in some way confines the energy her painting exude, adding to their elusiveness.

Western Explorers of the Himalaya





During the exhibition, Prof Marcus Nuesser, from the Department of Geography, South Asia Institute, University of Heidelberg, gave a talk on 'Nature and Culture in the Himalayas, Colonial Representation by the Schlagintweit Brothers'.

Schlagintweit Expedition to India and High Asia 1854 - 58

In 1854, three brothers - Hermann, Robert and Adolf - carried out an expedition in India on behalf of the British government to map towns and villages, water bodies, glaciers, and mountain ranges. The brothers also sketched and painted the landscape. Joseph Sartorius followed in their footsteps in Ladakh, taking comparative photographs at some of the same locations they visited. The exhibition, curated by Joseph Sartorius, brought together prints of the Schlagintweit's paintings and his photographs.

The prints of the Schlagintweit's paintings were generously donated to LAMO by the Alpine Museum of the German Alpine Club, Munich, Germany. The exhibition was supported by LAHDC Leh, Jammu & Kashmir Tourism, and Museum Funfkontinente, Munich.

INNER PATH FESTIVAL



LAMO was delighted to showcase the works of artists: Chemat Dorjey, Jigmet Angmo, Gurmet Kungyam, Isaac Gergan, Tashi Palmo and Stanzin Nyentak during the Inner Path Festival in New Delhi in October.

The Inner Path festival brings together art, films and philosophy that have a Buddhist focus.. This edition of the four day festival was threaded together by various events including the screening of international documentary films on Buddhism, a specially curated art and photography exhibition, a panel discussion involving artists and filmmakers, discourses by eminent Buddhist teachers and scholars and varied cultural programmes.



Opening the exhibition on water with a question pertinent to all our lives, Tsering Motup, the curator, goes on to show a variety of ways in which water impacts our lives. Focusing on Water in the lives of residents of Old Town he invites various artists to look at How Water plays an important role in everyone's life? And how it has a different narrative in the alleys of Old Town. The exhibition covered the work of several artists from images of those who worked on an ice project to sound art installations, poetry and video.

The exhibition is an outcome of a project LAMO has been working on, with support from BORDA (Bremen Overseas Research Development Association), to study the impact of water in Leh and Kargil towns






Talks

Living Waters - how can a digital museum address our complex water challenges?



From Tabo to Alchi revisiting early weestern Himalayas



Christian Luczanits's talk gave new data and interpretations for paintings of Alchi Monastery, as well as Tabo, Lalung and Dungkar. His recent research not only clarified some of the sources but also lead to a rethinking of the standard interpretation of esoteric Buddhism in the Early Western Himalayan monuments dating from the 11th to 13th centuries. Christian proposed a new interpretation for the development of public esoteric Buddhism as it is reflected in these monuments.

Talk on Sexual Health



Water, the primal fluid, has shaped rich civilizations across India, inspired art and architecture, stories and folklore, rituals and practices, poems, songs, music, film and dance. The Living Waters Museum (LWM), a digital platform, was launched in January 2017, to collect and collate rich and diverse traditions of water practices in India and build a repository of visualised knowledge, which can commemorate the past, inspire the present and be a source of learning for the future. Sara Ahmed, founder of the Living Waters Museum, talked about the process of developing the platform based on collaboration and across disciplines, engaging young people in project-based learning, essentially storytelling, around the many dimensions of water heritage, and its intersection with livelihoods, natural and built environments and the creative arts.

Sara has been working on the political economy of water in India since 1986, and in her current work she explores the role of water museums in facilitating conversations on water heritage and governance.

Photographic Projects in Mustang 1996-2017



Jaroslav Poncar is well known in Ladakh for his photographs that date back to 1974, the year the region first opened to tourists. Since then, his 'Photographic Journeys' have taken him to many parts of the Indian Himalayas, Tibet, Nepal, Burma, Cambodia and Yemen. This presentation of his focused on his visits to Mustang from 1996-2017. In the 1990's a research programme called the 'High Mountain Archeology' financed by the German government took Jaroslav along with conservation architect John Harrison (who restored the buildings in the LAMO Centre) and artist Robert Powell to document the architecture of Mustang. At the time, it was the only existing place where Tibetan culture and heritage still remained largely untouched.


In 1998, the American Himalaya Foundation requested him to document the 15th century wall paintings in the temples of Lomanthang.


Talk on Photography

Democracy, Governance and Sustainable Development - aworkshop by Ashish Kothari




